

Her many professional achievements include serving as director of NYU Langone Health's Pediatric Cardiology program, chief of Bellevue's Children and Adolescent Cardiac Clinics, professor of pediatrics at NYU Grossman School of Medicine, president of the NY Heart Association, and editor of the journal Pediatric Cardiology. Dr. Doyle devoted a significant portion of her career to the clinical management of young cardiac patients and to teaching medical students, house staff and fellows. She also worked closely with NYU Langone's surgeons to develop a comprehensive model for optimal care of children with congenital and rheumatic heart disease. In 2012, she was awarded the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Fordham University for "her years of dedicated service to children and their families, and for her generosity toward future generations of physicians."

**Stephen A. Warnke**, Partner at Ropes & Gray LLP, is a seasoned, versatile, and highly respected New York health care lawyer. Stephen advises complex, nonprofit health systems, government-funded managed care organizations, and community-based human services agencies, as well as some of America's leading health-sector businesses. #### LILLIAN D. WALD



In the 1890s, in the midst of what would become known as the Gilded Age, two women in matching dark blue uniforms, each carrying a small black bag of first aid supplies, were a familiar sight on the teeming streets of Manhattan's Lower East Side. Lillian Wald and Mary Brewster had both recently graduated from the New York School of Nursing and were living in a neighborhood populated mainly by immigrants—families who found themselves living in cramped walk-up tenements, struggling to maintain their health as they tried to dig their way out of poverty.

One day in 1893, the young daughter of an immigrant student in Lillian Wald's home nursing class asked Wald to attend to her mother, who lay suffering with an untreated hemorrhage back in her small tenement room. The experience shook Lillian to her core, and at that moment she decided she would devote her life to caring for the poor and vulnerable.

The two nurses began providing nursing services to the community, dispensing healing and advice while wearing badges reading "Visiting Nurse Under the Auspices of the Board of Health." So was born the organization that would one day become the VNS Health.

Recruiting other nurses to assist in their endeavors, Lillian Wald and Mary Brewster headed out on their daily neighborhood rounds, which included educating residents about disease transmission and personal hygiene and providing medical care for illnesses, with all fees based on the patient's ability to pay. Thus, the term "public health nurse" was established by Wald. Additionally, Wald was instrumental in creating the first public school nurse position, and in 1900 she convinced the New York Board of Education to let a schoolteacher hold the first-ever class for children with learning disabilities or physical handicaps. She also initiated the first school lunch program in 1905, and in 1912, after years of lobbying, persuaded the U.S. government to establish the Federal Children's Bureau, charged with investigating and reporting on all matters pertaining to the welfare of children among all classes of people. Wald also believed that every person was entitled to equal and fair health care regardless of their socio-economic status, race, gender, or age, and went on to cofound Lincoln House to extend health care to black New Yorkers and joined Florence Kellev and Henry Moskowitz in founding the National Association for Colored People (NAACP) in 1909. Wald was elected the first president of the National Organization for Public Health Nursing in 1912 and remained a leader and innovator in public health throughout the rest of her life.

Today, VNS Health continues to embody this idealistic woman's wish to nurse the sick and destitute, as we work to fulfill Lillian's vision through a wide range of programs and activities. We are proud to be carrying out her legacy, and to be part of the broader public health and social support network that she helped to establish.

Eugenie F. Doyle, MD board member emerita vns health

Eugenie Fleri Doyle, MD, life-long New Yorker, was born in 1921 and decided at a young age to become a doctor. Her father, Dr. Paul Fleri, had an office in their Brooklyn brownstone, made housecalls, and during the Depression accepted chickens or goats in lieu of payment; patient-centered healthcare was learned at home!

A stellar student, Dr. Doyle earned a Bachelor of Science degree Summa cum Laude from Marymount College Tarrytown and graduated from Johns Hopkins Medical School in 1946. In 1947, Dr. Doyle arrived at Bellevue to complete a fellowship in pediatric cardiology before joining the faculty of the NYU School of Medicine. In 1958 she became director of NYU's Pediatric Cardiology program and chief of Bellevue's Children and Adolescent Cardiac Clinics. She became a full professor of pediatrics at NYU School of Medicine in 1970. At the same time, she and her husband, the late Joseph A. Doyle, raised five children, two of whom became doctors as well!

Over the next 25 years, Dr. Doyle devoted herself to the clinical management of young cardiac patients and to teaching medical students, house staff and fellows. She worked closely with NYU's surgeons to develop a comprehensive model for optimal care of children with congenital and rheumatic heart disease. She remains in contact with some of their grateful families to this day. She also edited the journal Pediatric Cardiology for many years.

In 2012 she was awarded the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Fordham University for "her years of dedicated service to children and their families, and for her generosity toward future generations of physicians."

In addition to her clinical and academic achievements, Dr Doyle is past president of the NY Heart Association and served on advisory boards, including the NY State Department of Health's Cardiac Advisory committee and the Visiting Nurse Service of NY (now VNS Health) from which she only recently retired.

She is a skilled gardener, seasoned traveler and a devoted fan of the New York Yankees and the New York City Ballet. She credits her happy, nearly 70-year marriage as the secret to her longevity. In addition to her five children, she has twelve grandchildren (including a nurse and a doctor), and 10 great grandchildren. A model of hard work and natural gifts, she is quick to say, "I've been lucky."
